Mission Sunday 2019

This year's theme is Baptized and Sent: The Church of Christ on Mission in the World. Celebrating this day of mission will help us first to rediscover the missionary dimension of our faith in Jesus Christ, a faith graciously bestowed on us in baptism. Our filial relationship with God is not something simply private, but always in relation to the Church. Through our communion with God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – we are born to new life. This divine life is not a product for sale but a treasure to be given, communicated and proclaimed: that is the meaning of mission. We received this gift freely and we share it freely (cf. Mt 10:8), without excluding anyone. God wills that all people be saved by coming to know the truth and experiencing his mercy through the ministry of the Church, the universal sacrament of salvation (cf. 1 Tim 2:4; Lumen Gentium, 48).

This missionary mandate touches us personally: I am a mission, always; you are a mission, always; every baptized man and woman is a mission. ... As far as God's love is concerned, no one is useless or insignificant. Each of us is a mission to the world, for each of us is the fruit of God's love. Even if parents can betray their love by lies, hatred and infidelity, God never takes back his gift of life. From eternity he has destined each of his children to share in his divine and eternal life (cf. *Eph* 1:3-6).

This mission is part of our identity as Christians; it makes us responsible for enabling all men and women to realize their vocation to be adoptive children of the Father, to recognize their personal dignity and to appreciate the intrinsic worth of every human life, from conception until natural death. Today's rampant secularism, when it becomes an aggressive cultural rejection of God's active fatherhood in our history, is an obstacle to authentic human fraternity, which finds expression in reciprocal respect for the life of each person.

A NEW SAINT WITH A LOCAL CONNECTION...

On October 13, 2019, Cardinal John Henry Newman was 'raised to the altars' – he was declared a Saint by Pope Francis. John Henry Newman was born in London in 1801 and was brought up in the Anglican Church. He studied theology and was ordained an Anglican priest in 1825. However, as time went on, Newman felt called more and more to the Roman Catholic Church and was received into the Church in 1845, being ordained priest in Rome a year later for the congregation of the Oratory of St Philip Neri.

The new Saint had a connection to Whitefriar Street and the local area. In 1854 the Irish bishops invited him to Dublin to establish a Catholic University (which became U.C.D.), which included the construction of University Church, St Stephen's Green where he ministered. Whitefriar Street Church is a quick walk to where Newman lived and there can be little doubt that he visited our beloved church from time to time.

Though not a bishop and not a member of the hierarchy of England & Wales, Pope Leo XIII created Newman a Cardinal in 1879 at the request of many leading Catholics in England. He also allowed the Cardinal to continue to live at the Birmingham Oratory, where he died in August 1890.

O Lord, support us all the day long, until the shadows lengthen, and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed, and the fever of life is over, and our work is done.

Then in your mercy, grant us a safe lodging and a holy rest, and peace at the last.
