In the Jewish religious calendar, the feast of Pentecost is celebrated fifty days after Passover and faithful Jews were expected to make the journey to Jerusalem to celebrate the feast at the Temple. This was why the apostles and disciples were back in Jerusalem that day – despite their fear of being arrested like Jesus, they still came to the Temple to worship God and observe the religious holy days. The city was also bustling with many other visitors to observe the festival. Yet, unlike the other visitors, the disciples kept to themselves even after the Lord had appeared to them and spoken with them in the first forty days after the Passover. Now, however, everything was about to change.

The book of the Acts of the Apostles tells of the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the followers of Jesus Christ and of the effect it had on them. One effect was that when the Holy Spirit came down upon them, all fear was overcome and they went out into the streets with confidence and strength. Another effect was that they were able to speak in different languages. They began to teach the people in the streets about the risen Jesus and all those who were in the city were able to understand what was being said, no matter where they came from.

This was the moment the Lord had been preparing them for, the moment when they would take his mission to preach the Good News of the love of God and to do so beginning from Jerusalem but to preach to all peoples. This is the birth of the Church, the day its mission of spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ began, a mission and task which has never ceased, but which is as important and necessary now as it was all those centuries ago.

As heirs of the Apostles we too have received the Holy Spirit, most notably at Baptism and Confirmation, and it is up to us to respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit in our lives and to give praise and glory to God by the lives we lead. We should also follow the example of the Apostles on Pentecost Day and spread the Good News about the Kingdom of God beginning in our own homes and neighbourhoods. We can do this by living out the Gospel in our lives, by allowing the Gospel to guide our decisions, by letting others see that we believe in Jesus Christ.

A SAINT OR TWO THIS WEEK...

ST KEVIN, ABBOT

Kevin (Coemgenus) was one of the great sixth century Irish saints. He grew up in Kilnamanagh, Dublin, and later went to Glendalough, Co Wicklow, to become a hermit where he settled in Disert Caoimhghin, by the upper lake. In time, several other hermits joined him and soon the great monastic settlement of Glendalough grew up by the lakes and continued to spread after his death in 618.

ST BONIFACE, BISHOP & MARTYR

Boniface was born in Devon, south-west England, about the year 675. He became a monk and left England in 716 to preach the Gospel in Germany, where he established monasteries and dioceses before carrying out an ecclesiastical reform in Gaul (roughly present-day France, Luxembourg, Belgium, Switzerland and northern Italy). He was consecrated bishop in 722 and was later Primate of Germany. In his seventies, he retired and travelled about the country again. He was martyred for the faith in Friesland, in northern Holland, in 754.

WHEN CAN WE HAVE PUBLIC MASS AGAIN?

Many people have asked this question because they have a great desire to be closer to the Lord and to receive Holy Communion. The date given by the government for the return of public Mass is July 20. Coming to Mass is not the same as going to a shop: at Mass we will be in close proximity to others not for a few minutes but for half an hour, and receiving Holy Communion means being in very close proximity to a priest or Minister of the Eucharist. It is important that we remain patient and vigilant for a little while longer and pray that things may improve quickly and allow the date for public Mass to be brought forward.
